Borough Administrator Vozech – Report

Resolution 133 – Authorizing preparation of 2022 estimated property tax bills due August 1st
Each year we do a resolution authorization preparation of estimated property tax bills in advance of the 3rd quarter billing due August 1st. This is necessitated by the fact that the County of Bergen must certify all four components of the property tax rate (Board of Education 69%, Municipal 20%, County 10% and Library 1%) prior to the final 2022 property tax rates being set. Since that County certification has not occurred yet and bills need to be issued a minimum of thirty days before they are due, we will be sending them out later this month. Once the County certification process is complete the final 2022 rate will be implemented and reflected in the fourth quarter property tax billing. The Board of Education, Municipal and Library portion of the 2022 property tax rate have all been set pending certification and along with an estimate for the County component are reflected in the total estimated 2022 property tax rate of \$2.637 which overall is a 1.70% increase from 2021.

Resolution 134 – Authorizing disposal of asset – This resolution authorizes disposal of an old laptop well past its life cycle from Building Dept/OEM that will be replaced.

Resolutions 136 – Authorizing execution of a grant contract with the New Jersey Department of Transportation for Safety Improvements around Tisdale School Area – Ramsey has submitted an application for improvements in this area regarding road resurfacing, sidewalks, signage and traffic enhancements for a number of years. Recently we were notified in the letter of May 27th, listed on communications, that we have been awarded \$250,000 through this grant program. We will be reviewing the award, updating the scope of work and selecting an engineer to develop plans and bid documents during 2022, with project planned for 2023.

Parking In Municipal Lots: As Councilwoman Woods and myself have both discussed previously at Mayor & Council meetings, we are reviewing a couple of updates regarding parking in municipal lots. These can be broken down into a number of categories by the type of parking as follows:

-Resident Commuter Parking – As noted in prior months we have reviewed the annual resident commuter parking fees and are introducing an ordinance tonight updating those fees. As will be discussed in the introduction of the ordinance, these rates have not been updated in over 20 years and are significantly lower than other municipalities. Additionally, this will mitigate in part, the increased maintenance costs of the lots including the repaving of all three in the last few years.

-Overnight Parking – Councilwoman Woods has been reviewing options with her committee to allow for overnight resident parking in municipal lots. We are proposing as part of this review, to institute on a trial basis, designating approximately 8-10 parking spaces in each lot (Erie Plaza, Mechanic St and North Central) for residents to park overnight (7pm to 7am). We would propose to establish a trial period for this by resolution with no fee for the remainder of this year. Usage would be reviewed and we would determine whether the program should continue and if so, any changes that would be needed such as actual permit placards or stickers and at that point implement an ordinance to codify the policy.

-Non-Resident Commuter Parking – We would propose to review for the remainder of 2022 utilization of our commuter lots to determine if we have excess unused spaces in our lot on North Central to allow for a limited number of spaces which for non-resident commuter parking. If we feel there is more than enough available resident parking, we would consider on a calendar year basis, allowing out of town commuter parking. These permit fees would be at a significantly higher cost than resident spaces and limited to a designated area in the North Central lot only.

Ordinances for Introduction:

Ordinance 10-2022 – Ordinance amending Chapter 8 of the Borough Code to update Resident Commuter Parking Fees – As we have discussed a number of times previously at Mayor & Council meetings and was addressed in my April 27th report. Ramsey has not increased the rate on annual commuter parking permits for over 20 years. This ordinance will increase the annual commuter parking permit fee to \$50 with additional permits in the same household at a rate of \$25 annually. While increased from current, these rates are literally a fraction of what NJ Transit annual rates are for their parking in Ramsey at \$480 a year and also well below other towns. Below is a chart for area towns all other towns with annual parking charge in excess of \$100 and most are significantly over that and Ridgewood over \$1,000 annually.

Ordinances for Public Hearing & Adoption:

Ordinance 07-2022 – Bond Ordinance for funding of a number of Borough improvements as set forth below in total of \$775,000 North Central Field Renovation – Borough has a project underway to add a parking lot to the recreation field on North Central Ave which currently has no off-street parking. This will be added adjacent to the field between the field and the roadway. The field will be shifted further away from the roadway to accommodate the parking. This project will require approvals from NJDEP, County of Bergen and Mahwah before work can begin. We have started the engineering and permitting process to date. Ramsey has previously been awarded an Open Space Grant of \$67,500 which will mitigate some of the cost when reimbursed on completion. Project funding \$225,000

Finch Park Pickleball Courts – Borough has a project to convert the area at Finch Park which currently has a street hockey rink into a new use with construction of four new pickleball courts. This project also has an Open Space Grant of \$72,500 which would again mitigate the taxpayer cost when reimbursed upon completion. Project funding \$232,000

Police and Other Emergency Service Vehicles – Purchase of new vehicles including apparatus and equipment for the Ramsey Police Department, Ramsey Fire Department and Ramsey Rescue Squad. Vehicles include a pickup truck for the use of the Ramsey Police Patrol Services Unit and an SUV for police command staff. Ramsey Fire Department and Rescue Squad purchases would also both be one command vehicle for each department. Project funding \$318,000

Ordinance 08-2022 – Bond Ordinance for Board of Public Works Phase I of the Water Service Line Replacement Program in amount of \$900,000 – As we have discussed at previous Mayor and Council meetings as well as Board of Public Works (“BPW”) meetings, in compliance with the recently enacted New Jersey law requiring water service line replacements by water utilities for all service lines containing galvanized or lead over a ten year period, Ramsey BPW will be starting the replacement process in 2022. The first lines in this program will be on Wyckoff Avenue and Main Street in advance of Bergen County resurfacing those roads later this year. This ordinance is for the first phase and there will be subsequent funding ordinances for future phases through the 10-year replacement timeframe.

Ordinance 09-2022 – Amending Borough Salary Ordinance – Borough sets salaries based on collectively bargained agreements with those employees covered under the applicable agreements and by resolution for those non-union employees. We do however maintain by ordinance a salary range for certain positions which is updated typically annually. The last update to the salary range ordinance was in 2019, this ordinance updates salary ranges for some positions consistent with salary increases in line with those changes to union labor agreements similarly applied to the non-union employees. To reiterate this does not set salary for non-union employees which will be done subsequently by resolution within the ordinance range.

ADMINISTRATOR VOZEH REPORT (cont'd)

Borough 2022 Road Resurfacing Program – The annual road resurfacing work discussed at prior meetings is currently ongoing. The contractor posted signs ahead of the project on those streets to be resurfaced with a general timeline. Daily, the contractor provides schedule for milling and paving for the following day's work. This information is posted on the Borough website along with notifications going out through the RAVE alert system. Based on the current schedule we anticipate the work to be complete under this program by the end of this week to beginning of next week weather permitting.

RAVE Alerts – As discussed at numerous Mayor & Council meetings over the last several months, the Borough has transitioned over to a new communication platform for emergency and non-emergency notifications utilizing Rave Mobile Safety. RAVE has a full-service platform and capability to do voice, text and email notifications. As previously noted, phone numbers in the prior Swiftreach system moved over automatically to RAVE, so residents who were receiving phone messages would continue to do so. However, notification information in the old Nixle system could not be automatically migrated over to RAVE so must be input by residents into the new RAVE platform for those seeking this communication method (texts and emails) for notifications. This can be done through the Borough website, www.ramseynj.com. Also, for those residents no longer seeking to receive notifications there are opt out instructions on the website.

X. INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES
