COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES
May 13, 2009

Mayor Botta called the regular meeting of the Mayor and Council to order. Council President led the Pledge of Allegiance. Mayor read the Open Public Meetings law notice.

I. ROLL CALL

IV. BOARD OF EDUCATION BUDGET

Mayor stated Councilman Vozeh will report on the negotiations and discussions with the Board of Education. Councilman Vozeh stated that there is a resolution to bring the total Board of Education budget down to \$51.1 million which is a change from last year, \$470,000 lower. Health insurance increases are estimated to be around 22% this year and contract increases are at 4%. Those health insurance increases as well as salary increases would have brought the budget up by \$2 ½ million just to stay *status quo*. Reductions have been made by eliminating 15 full-time staff and teacher aide positions; elimination of one part-time staff, as well as other part-time and summer positions, mostly Buildings and Grounds, and custodial; elimination of health benefits for all aides, a 12% reduction in building costs supply budgets; some of the middle school sports programs and those which are offered as an alternative by the town recreation, for instance, basketball. Some of the extra-curricular High School Club programs would be reduced. Those reductions will basically offset the salary and health insurance increases. There is a direct budget cut of \$649,432.00 which eliminates the health benefits for aides and additional cuts in the building supply budget. Additionally, we are not increasing the budget by the anticipated increase in health insurance. Back in March when the Board of Education proposed their budget to the public, they expected 15% increase in health insurance. They are now learning that it is going to be 22% and that additional increase would translate into about \$367,000. We are not increasing the budget for

that. Once the final determination is made, the Board will have to make further adjustments to handle those costs. It could entail the \$649,432.00 and the Board will have further cuts. The other items talked about in the sub-committees are the policies relating to activity fees and whatever potential grant stimulus funding opportunities are available as well as reviewing the tuition rates and obviously health insurance options. That basically is a summation of the resolution in front of the Council tonight.

Ray DiMiglio, 169 Pine Street, asked what the total savings per taxpayer would be. Councilman Vozeh stated that the average household saving would be approximately \$50.00.

Richard Muti, 66 Church Street, stated that as a member of the Board of Education, he has to preface his remarks by saying that these are the remarks of Richard Muti and not of the Board. If there any members of the press here, these are not Board comments. I was privileged to serve on the committee that discussed this with your council committee, including Bruce Vozeh and Art Nalbandian. I want to commend both of them on the professional and thorough way they went about the process. You are charged with an awesome responsibility and that is to be mindful of the public will in this matter, while at the same time not affecting to any serious degree the thorough and efficient education that we strive to provide to all children in Ramsey. I think that by passing the resolution tonight, you will achieve both responsibilities. This is the second year in a row that the budget has been defeated and it was a larger margin this time. Last year, I believe you cut approximately \$300,000 and this year the cut will be more than twice that amount, which I think is reflective of the public will. I think you are also taking into consideration the school board will be faced with the added responsibility of dealing with an unexpected increase in the cost of health insurance benefits. During the course of committee discussions, we were presented with a letter from the board's insurance consultant which indicated that the board would face a 25% increase in health insurance benefits for school employees. Subsequent to getting that letter, the Business Administrator was able to get that figure down to about 22% but that is a serious challenge to deal with and this is really representing the Board finding \$1 million in cuts in order to rectify this budget. This was a good resolution of this particular issue. Next year, the challenges will be greater as these costs continue to escalate. We are constrained by an employee contract with the largest employee group, the Teachers' Union, that prevents us from making any changes in those health insurance benefits for teachers for another two years. If we get another letter from our insurance consultant next year, I don't see how we are going to be able to put forth a budget that does not seriously affect the educational experience and that is a daunting prospect to look at and we will deal with it when we have to; hopefully we can plan ahead. I just wanted to tell you that I was very appreciative of the role played by the Council in this and I support the resolution that you are about to pass tonight.

Mayor and Council Comments

Councilman Vozeh stated that the Mayor and Council were brought into the school budget process by the action of the people, when the budget was defeated. We may find it disappointing that only 1 in 3 registered voters actually turned out to vote that day, the results are clear. I have talked to 100's of people and the main recurring theme seemed to be that we are in an economic crisis. Most of the municipalities around us actually came out to support their budgets, but Ramsey did not. Why was Ramsey different? I think it is clear that in this time of economic crisis with residents seeing lay-offs, wage freezes, benefit reductions, sky rocketing insurance contributions, etc., the long drawn-out teachers' contract seemed to frustrate people. Renegotiating the teachers' contract

with salaries, benefits, pension, policy of tenure, etc., was not a task we could tackle. It is not something we could touch in this process. There are contracts in place and we need to live with them, whether we like them or not. Just spending a few minutes on the process we went through, the Mayor had appointed a sub-committee of myself, Councilmen Nalbandian and Jones, to work with the Board of Education sub-committee which consisted of Board President Nunziata, Vice President Gasparovich, Trustees Behrmann and Muti, along with Superintendent Montesano and Assistant Superintendent Marcotulli. During this process, Councilman Jones had to step aside for conflicts. We received a small mountain of budget reports and went through it in depth and had lengthy meetings with board representatives. At the same time, the Board came up with a prioritized list and put everything on the table. We used that list and our committee came back to the Mayor and Council with different sub-committee meetings to determine how deep those cuts should go. While we differed individually, we came to a consensus at the level that is being proposed tonight. We took this back to the Board and while we have not agreed on everything, we finally came to a resolution which is recommended for passage tonight. I would anticipate the Board of Education will do the same and reduce their future needs. In short, we believe that what we are recommending is both responsive to the taxpayers, and maintains the quality level of education. Some people may question why we didn't go further in the cuts. We are not increasing the budget; so there is another round of cuts coming from the Board of Ed. In addition, we felt that the next cut items would have a deeper impact on the quality of education being provided. Class sizes are being pushed to the edge and we have already started to cut the athletic programs. There are no capital improvement projects in the budget and we reviewed the administrative staffing. The State averages 155 students per administrator and we have 193. I believe we did a comprehensive review. During our meetings, we did ask the Borough Attorney and outside Labor Counsel to review case law and legal opinions on the ability to use mandatory employee furloughs. It is something that is being proposed by the State government and currently it only applies to Civil Service entities. It may be challenged somewhere down the road, but in order to meet the time deadline, we could not contemplate reviewing or using. I would give one final recommendation and I hope that the Board and its unions could come up with some sort of voluntary mutual solution that could help the district. We have more education days than are required by law. There is no reason why the Board could not come to an agreement to reduce the number of work days for a reduction in salary. It would help save staff and programs. Hopefully, everyone can be part of the solution. I believe that all of the employees are truly dedicated and concerned about the children, as well as the overall quality of education. My personal experience has been nothing but positive. Being a numbers person, I find it difficult to solve 100% of the budget problem when you are not touching 77% and only try to solve the 23%. This has not been an easy process and we may very well be in a lose/lose situation. I would like to thank Roy Montesano, Bob Marcotulli, John Nunziata, Tony Gasparovich, Laura Behrmann, and Richard Muti from the Board of Education. I would also like to thank my colleagues here who worked very hard with us. I hope we have made the best from a difficult situation.

Councilman Nalbandian added that a few things bear repeating. I would like to commend the Board of Education's Committee as well as Superintendent Montesano and Assistant Superintendent Marcotulli for their efforts in reaching a consensus on the budget. I would also like to commend Councilman Vozeh who did the bulk of the work and his leadership during the process was outstanding. I can't think of a better person in this community to have been given the task. It was a very difficult and important task (chairing that committee) and we are very lucky that Bruce was involved in the process. It is important to note that the ultimate cuts that are going to be made primarily as a result of the unexpected additional health care costs will be approximately

\$1 million unless the Board can get the costs reduced. Nevertheless, the number is going to be higher than the \$650,000.00 which Bruce discussed in detail here. It is a significant number. There were some recent articles in today's Record concerning Allendale and Northern Highlands. If you take a look at the size of the school budget here compared to the size of the budget in that community, as well as Teaneck, I think you will see proportionately that when you look at \$1 million in cuts, it is a substantial figure. Proportionately, it is more than the other communities. It was not an easy task and, as Bruce noted, every component of the school budget was reviewed. We were provided with detailed information to review. We looked at all of the line items, nothing was taken for granted. Bruce said we asked the Board and the Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent to give us what they believe in their priorities had to reach certain levels of cuts and substantial levels of cuts at various intervals, what would you cut? I think it is important to note that the Board and particularly, the Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, are most familiar with the education as provided in this community. I don't think anybody can dispute that Ramsey provides a very high level of excellent education in Ramsey schools. They have so far quite a while. It was important to get that information from them. That being said, neither Bruce nor I took any of that information for granted. There was some very healthy debate and discussion and perhaps even some disagreement on a few of the items, and I think that is important for the public to know. The process entailed that healthy but critical dialogue and debate on the items in particular and the figures that went with each of those items. Ultimately, after a number of meetings, we arrived at what we have here today; what we believe was a truly collective effort to achieve and I hope I can speak for everyone on that committee, as well as the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent and say that we reached something that is in the best interest of the community, given the task that we were charged with. The financial landscape, funding public education in this State, unfortunately I think by all accounts is not going to improve in the near future and the truth of the matter is that it is probably going to get worse. I think the Board and the Administration and some of the suggestions that we have made to them is going to have think very long and hard in the next couple of years about their budgets and those terms because as I said, the financial landscape is not going to improve. Frankly, the only way it is going to improve is when the Governor and the elected State Officials in N.J. determine that there is a better way to fund public education in this state than through property taxes. There are other ways, I think, and I won't go into them here, that they can address some of the financial waste, if you will, and costs involved in public education in NJ. The sooner they get to that and face the reality that it needs to be done, the sooner that municipalities like Ramsey and all municipalities and school districts in this state will benefit. It is as simple as that, but again just to conclude my remarks, I am obviously going to be in favor of this resolution and I think it is fair, especially given what the administration is saddled with as far as finding additional cuts. I think it is important to note that we didn't give them a pass on that additional cost that they account for; we basically left it to their discretion as to how and what they are going to cut once they ultimately determine what that amount needs to be. What additional cuts they need to make to account for the higher health care costs. That would conclude my comments. Thank you.

Councilwoman Dillon stated that she would like to recognize the Council team and the Board of Education team for their dedication to an extremely difficult task of cutting an already reduced budget, while maintaining the quality of education received by the children enrolled in the Ramsey School System. I just want everyone to be cognizant of the fact that if somehow the economy should magically revive itself in the next year, because of the cuts that were made to the Board of Ed budget by the Board of Ed itself, they were very severe cuts this year, in essence the \$1 million

cuts that we are imposing on the Board of Ed budget, if the economy should improve, they can't just magically be reinstated next year. As the Board of Ed is painfully aware, and so is our Committee that negotiated with them, the Board of Ed is subject to very restrictive caps imposed by the State, so many of these cuts are now going to become permanent. There is no way to get them back into the budget in the future. Once again, I commend all of you on a great job and I highly urge the Board of Ed to seriously consider imposing activity fees and pursuing grant money. Thank you.

Motion by Vozech, seconded by Nalbandian, to accept resolution no. 120-2009 pertaining to the School Budget tax levy for 2009-2010 for the General Fund be set at \$43,243,170.00.

Mayor thanked everyone on the Board of Education Committee and the Council Committee for their hard work on this difficult task in a very constrained time period. I think the Council's Resolution is a good compromise and a good solution and I would urge the Board of Education to accept it as it is presented.

VI. COMMITTEE AND LIAISON REPORTS

A. FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION -Councilman Andrew Siemsen

My thanks to my colleagues on the Council and the members of the Board of Ed negotiating team for their work on the budget, as well as Superintendent Roy Montesano and Assistant Superintendent Bob Marcotulli for the work they did on the defeated school budget.

B. PUBLIC SAFETY – Councilman William Jones

The July 4th weekend has been set by the Fine Arts Council involving a tribute to the 40th anniversary of Woodstock. There will be 12 local bands on July 3rd and on Saturday, there will be various crafts and artists throughout the afternoon and a concert featuring Richie Havens, original performer at Woodstock. The fireworks and the Wind Symphony will take place that evening. Open Mic Nights continue on the 4th Saturday at Border's. My congratulations to all of the Shield Award recipients who will be honored on Friday night. A special congratulations to Officer Tim Shoemaker who was the NJ DARE Officer of the Year. He does an incredible job and he has a dramatic effect on our children. I would also congratulate the Environmental Commission, the Jr. Women's Club, and Rescue Squad for the great Clean-Up Day. Various groups

all did a great job. I would like to commend Det. Sgt. Novakowski for his excellent police work involving several fast food restaurants, up and down Rt. 17. I had to recuse myself from the school budget because of a pending employment situation involving my wife and the schools. The work on the school budget was a difficult task and has long-term ramifications. I think many of the people who voted against this budget did not understand what programs are going to be cut and may never come back because of the cap laws. The anti-vote will hurt everyone – students and taxpayers as property values could be effected long-term. Least effected will be the teachers’ contract which is where most of their anger and their no vote was intended. We must look at what is happening here. Cuts will effect class size and the bigger they get, the worse off the children will be. It is not 1950, 1970, or even 2000 anymore. We look at approaching 25 – 30 kids in a class. It may have worked many years ago, but with computers and technology advances, you could not fit that many kids in a classroom. We would have to look at possibly building more schools. I commend the efforts that were put forth here to not hit those numbers, but that is something that we are headed for and I ask that people pay more attention. Today is not the day of ink wells and quills; too many people still think that way. The two-thirds of the voters who did not come out to vote must wake up. The future of sports, the band, the plays, clubs and all 30 kid classrooms are much closer than they think if the budgets continue to be defeated. I urge all residents to get involved and take the time to learn and understand the budget process. The pound of flesh that many voters wanted was not exacted here and many people will loose because of it. As many of you know, my prior experience in trying to get a school built in East Rutherford for 10 years is one of the main reasons why I moved to Ramsey. People were looking backwards and not looking to the future and how it would affect property values and the students’ education. It took nine years after I was gone to get a new school built. When that school opened, all of a sudden the quality of education in East Rutherford became much higher, only because of a new building. It was the same outstanding people working in that building. Property values have since tripled and we need to continue to look forward. I want to urge the school boards and its administrators to look at simpler solutions, such as shutting off the lights which are left on constantly, lowering the heat, and even going to a paperless system or using less paper. Those are pennies that will add up to big dollars and could help the taxpayers in many ways. Trenton will not help us; we must help ourselves. I thank Councilman Vozeh and Councilman Nalbandian for the fine work they did, as well as the Board of Education members. This is a no win situation for anyone and I think they have done what was asked by the voters. I thank them for their time and effort.

- C. BUILDING, PLANNING & ZONING – Councilman Arthur M. Nalbandian
Congratulations to Officer Shoemaker on being chosen as the DARE Officer of the year. We knew that he was the best DARE Officer in NJ. I guess now it is official. I would also like to wish everyone a happy Memorial Day weekend and hope to see you at the parade.
- D. UTILITIES, BUILDINGS & GROUNDS – Councilman Bruce Vozeh
We will have committee recommendations at the next work session for this year’s projects. The ordinance for the library renovation project will be introduced at the next meeting, or the beginning of June. The estimated start date is the end of summer.

- E. PUBLIC & GOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS – Councilwoman Vanessa Jachzel
We have relaunched the Ramsey Journal and it was mailed out on Thursday. We have gotten a lot of positive feedback from that. We are going to keep this going and we will have 3 issues a year. One thing I would mention about the school budget is that this vote really represented people expressing their feelings about negotiation process and the teacher’s contract which resulted from it. Before long, this is going to be repeated. I think people need to have their feelings expressed before it is too late; before a contract is agreed to and they need to let the Board of Ed know that they are not going to be intimidated; that they will get out there and say, “We can’t afford to pay what we are paying”. We cannot afford 100% of the burden of benefits and health benefits as well as our own which we are contributing to; I would hope that is something that is taken to heart by the public and that people do get out there because this process will continue and it will repeat itself. Hopefully, the next time around there will be some chance to make a difference. Beyond that, I want to thank the negotiating team. We have a significant amount of money cut from the budget and my thanks to Councilmen Nalbandian and Vozeh who did a tremendous job.
- F. HEALTH, EDUCATION & SOCIAL SERVICES – Council President Deirdre A. Dillon
In addition to my earlier remarks, I want to congratulate the Shield Award winners and thank them for their service to the town. My congratulations to Officer Shoemaker for being named DARE Officer of the Year. I echo Councilwoman Jachzel’s comments. We saw what a very difficult position the Board of Ed found itself in and it was a no win situation.

Lastly, I think the Council Committee and the Board of Ed hit the right mark and it is a good job with a good result.
